RDMA's President Report Dr Kimberley Bondeson

We have some real winter chill happening at the moment, with night time temperatures on the Redcliffe Peninsular and Brisbane areas in single digits. This is associated with beautiful blue skies and bright sunshine during the day.

And yes, flu season has begun, along with Covid 19 infections and RSV. School holidays are also about to start, so we should see an increase in the weekend travel and quieter times during the week.

It seems that General Practitioners are quieter during these times, and the public hospitals are overflowing. Why this happens around school holidays I have never worked out.

The MyMedicare Scheme has gotten off with barely a blink. The reality of the scheme is it has little to offer except more paperwork in my opinion, particularly for doctors who attend residents in Aged Care Facilities.

Many of these residents do not have the ability to give consent to register with one practitioner, and then begins the long and often complex process of obtaining consent from their Next of Kin, or Power or Attorney.

For many practices, particularly smaller practices, there is absolutely no benefit from enrollment in MyMedicare.

And is it the beginning of Capitation by Stealth? Block funding to practices? I guess we will have to wait and see.

Payroll tax in Queensland - the State

Government announcing it is bringing an end to an 18 month payroll tax battle. "The RACGP has welcomed the change, which will see normal business arrangements, patient fees including Medicare benefits and

out-of-pocket fees, not subject to payroll tax when they are paid directly by a patient to a General Practitioners

Treasurer Cameron Dick made the announcement in State Parliament on Thursday morning, with the reform to be officially issued by the state's Revenue office next week." (News GP 21/6/24.)

The NSW payroll tax announcement is different. It states that the there will be no retrospectivity application which will ensure practices won't close because they have to backpay five years of payroll tax.

The bad news is rebates are tied to bulk billing. (RACGP President's Update – 21 June 2024). So, the fight is ongoing.

The Dinner for the Profession was an enjoyable evening, held recently. The next major AMAQ event is the AMAQ Conference in Greece, which should be an interesting, informative event.

Bribie Island Satellite Hospital (Yarun) – information for GPs

Minor Injury and Illness Clinic

The Minor Injury and Illness Clinic accepts patients from 8.00am to 10.00pm 7 days a week and provides walk-in urgent care for common injuries and illnesses such as strains and sprains, simple closed fractures, minor head injuries (with no loss of consciousness), infections, rashes, minor cuts and burns.

The Minor Injury and Illness Clinic will not provide complex emergency care or be a substitute for General Practice. The scope of services provided by the clinics is defined by the following patient factors:

- ambulant or able to stand transfer with one assist
- patients arriving via Queensland Ambulance Service (QAS) with minor injuries and illnesses
- the mechanism of injury is not high risk
- does not require complex investigations and work up does not require prolonged periods of observation.

Kidney Health Service

The Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital Kidney Health Services team will provide 12 renal dialysis chairs with capacity to treat approximately 24 patients each week at Bribie Island.

The service will be available three days per week with a focus on providing care for existing Kidney Health Service clients.

The Bribie Island Kidney Health Service will work in conjunction with other kidney health satellites sites such as the Redcliffe Dialysis unit, the North Lakes Dialysis unit and the 12-chair service recently opened at the Kallangur Satellite Hospital.

Day Medical Treatment Unit

Antibiotic Allergy Delabelling Service, RBWH & Redcliffe Hospitals

Redcliffe and the Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital (RBWH) both

offer an antibiotic allergy delabelling service for patients 16 years and over through the Infectious Disease Outpatient Clinic. Many patients are diagnosed with an antibiotic allergy after a variety of symptoms across different ages, however testing the antibiotic allergy shows that many of these patients can tolerate these antibiotics.

Any patient with an antibiotic allergy label is a good candidate for this service. Removal of antibiotic allergy labels can change an individual's future healthcare, improve patient outcomes, and reduce antimicrobial resistance. The RBWH see all antibiotic allergy labels, Redcliffe Hospital see penicillin allergies only. GPs can direct referrals for the Antibiotic Allergy Delabelling Service to the Infectious Disease Outpatient Clinic at the RBWH and Redcliffe Hospital. Referral by GP Smart Referrals is preferred.

Pulmonary Rehabilitation Services

Research shows that pulmonary rehabilitation is one of the best things patients with chronic lung diseases can do to improve their breathing and wellbeing [1]

Brisbane North GPs can now use GP Smart Referrals (GPSR) to help their patients access pulmonary rehab even more easily with new telerehabilitation programs removing geographical barriers and reducing wait times.

GPSR is the preferred referral method:

- In the "* Condition and Specialty" box, search for "Rehabilitation".
- Then, in the **** Service/Location**" menu, select your patient's nearest service:
 - "ROYAL BRISBANE & WOMEN'S HOSPITAL"
 - "THE PRINCE CHARLES HOSPITAL" (patients can also attend at ACU, Banyo)

• **"NORTH LAKES HEALTH PRECINCT"** (patients can also attend at Burpengary Regional Aquatic and Leisure Centre)

(Telerehabilitation can be accessed via all the above)

• Please then note exclusion criteria in GPSR before proceeding.

• GPSR will add essential information from practice software but do make sure this includes the relevant chronic lung condition.

- Whilst not essential, including any available spirometry results is very helpful.
- Quickly attaching other relevant investigations or specialist letters confirming the diagnosis will also assist.

Though all patients will need to have an initial face-to-face assessment, they can then choose to complete their course in person or online. Technical assistance with virtual participation can be provided if required.

Cardiac rehab can now also be accessed via GPSR. Hospitals usually refer directly after cardiac events but this is suitable for people with stable heart failure too. Referrals should be directed to "**north lakes health precinct**" and patients will be seen at their local community facility.



AMA QUEENSLAND UPDATE JUNE 2024

The past month has been a critical one for AMA Queensland advocacy on workforce, elective surgery waitlists and the state budget.

As the first half of the year quickly comes to a close, we reflect on what AMA Queensland and our members have achieved for the health of Queensland. Notably, the recently announced \$40,000 incentive for GPs to train in Queensland is a direct result of our advocacy that will guarantee all Queenslanders have access to best practice primary care and preventative health.

Despite the wins, our advocacy efforts remain at full speed as we closely examine the state budget and continue to

tackle the ongoing issue that is elective surgery wait lists.

STATE BUDGET HEALTH INVESTMENT

On Tuesday 11 June the state budget was handed down and it is clear the government has listened to our calls.

The budget includes a significant investment in the health workforce – the No.1 challenge currently facing our healthcare system.

We have been urging our government to follow the lead of Tasmania and Victoria and offer financial incentives for doctors to train as GPs for the past two years and are pleased to see it has been adopted as part of the new Health Workforce Strategy.

We are also pleased to see a first-time investment into primary care and general practice as, despite the importance of GPs in keeping people well and out of hospitals, funding has traditionally been a federal responsibility under Medicare.

Another notable win was the continued rollout of our Ramping Roundtable recommendations, particularly measures to help patients move through hospitals faster and be discharged after hours and on weekends.

Our first response to this year's budget is certainly a positive one, but we will continue closely examining the strategy, policies and promises from both sides of politics over the coming months.





QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT HOSPITAL DATA HOSPITAL


The Queensland Government's latest hospital data shows a slight improvement in elective surgery wait times, but we know this doesn't tell the whole story.

This slight improvement is largely attributed to the performance in metropolitan areas, as when you look at the regions, wait times remain high.

In Mackay, nearly 40 per cent of patients were forced to wait longer than recommended time according to the government's latest data. Central Queensland and Townsville also continued to experience longer wait times than their metropolitan counterparts during this period.

Currently, regional patients remain more likely to experience adverse health outcomes or end up in emergency departments due to the continued inequity in elective surgery access.

This is why we are convening a Surgical Wait List Roundtable to identify practical, affordable actions the Government can take to address inequities in access and change this trajectory.



SUPPORT NEEDED FOR LGBTQIASB+ COMMUNITIES

Prior to the state budget announcement, we called on the Queensland Government to fund a voluntary register to allow bereaved family and friends to notify fatal suicides in the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex, asexual, sistergirl and brotherboy (LGBTQIASB+) community in



our Budget Submission.


Members of the LGBTQIASB+ community face unique barriers and challenges in accessing healthcare that is culturally safe and appropriate for their needs.

AMA Queensland Council and LGBTQIASB+ working group member Dr James Allen spoke to this disparity from personal experiences as a GP who predominantly sees LGBTQIASB+ patients.

"When you're working in a community in which you belong, and people feel safe and accepted, there's sometimes an increased concentration on the number of patients who will see you to discuss mental health issues," Dr Allen told ABC News.

"Every doctor and every general practitioner really deserve a pathway towards becoming both culturally and technically competent when it comes to queer health."

We are calling for funding and reform to enable a voluntary register to allow surviving partners, family, friends, and clinicians to notify suicides to a suitable body, so we can work with the community and government to effectively develop measures to enhance mental health outcomes and keep people healthy and alive.



DR BOULTON WRAPS UP HER TERM AS PRESIDENT

At our Annual General Meeting and Dinner for the Profession in May, Dr Maria Boulton officially concluded her two-year tenure as AMA Queensland President.



While it would be impossible to summarise the impact she made over her time, we must acknowledge her successful efforts to protect our healthcare workers during COVID-19 and possibly her greatest achievement as President – winning an amnesty from payroll tax for GPs.

Dr Boulton's leadership maintained AMA Queensland's position as the state's peak medical body, and we seek to continue this legacy with the support of our members and new leadership team.



Following AMA Queensland's Annual General Meeting we also announced our new Board and Council for 2024-25.

In addition to our newly elected President and Vice President, Dr Eleanor Chew OAM was re-elected as Chair of the Board. Doctors from various specialties throughout the state have been elected as part of Council.

AMA QUEENSLAND AWARDS

Dinner for the Profession was also an opportunity to honour some outstanding members for their commitment and dedication to medicine and the community.

Prof Chris Perry OAM RFD was admitted to the *Role of Fellows*, Dr Peter Isdale AM was appointed as this year's *Distinguished Supporter Member* and Dr Nikhil Dwivedi was awarded the inaugural AMA Queensland *Doctor-in-Training Medal*.

Orda and Sabine Orda were also recognised with two of AMA Queensland's highest honours. Dr Orda received the *Rural Health Medal* and Mrs Orda the *Excellence in Health Care Medal*.



MEDISECURE DATA BREACH

We attended an early briefing on Friday 17 May from the National Office of Cyber Security in response to the recent MediSecure data breach.

The most important message is that patients should not hesitate to get their medications dispensed as the current prescription delivery service is not affected by the breach.

The Australian Government is continuing to work with Medisecure to respond to the incident, and we will continue to communicate the necessary information to our members.

CPD reflects the Medical Profession's Mental Health By Dr Mal Mohanlal

In the Medical Observer on the Internet, on 15 May 2024, the following article by Dr Craig Lienthal, with headlines, **"I have been 'self-reflecting' on how I became a good Doctor- the answer isn't CPD",** was published.

Dr Craig Lilienthal is a GP and medicolegal adviser in Sydney, NSW

The following is the summary of the article by ChatGPT:

In this article, Dr. Craig Lilienthal reflects on his journey to becoming a good doctor, emphasizing that formal education and Continuing Professional Development (CPD) programs were not the primary contributors to his professional development. He critiques the medical board's reliance on CPD requirements, arguing that they are unproven and ineffective. Instead, he attributes his growth as a doctor to practical experience, workload, and mentorship, particularly in rural practice. "Hi Craig – Your articles are always insightful, full of common sense and wisdom. Instead of earning your CPD points by reflecting, why don't you ask the authorities to scrap this system?

Everyone knows it is a political con designed to hoodwink the public to think we are practicing a higher standard of medicine because of it. By participating in this scheme, we are involved in fraudulent behaviour as a profession. It is all ethically and morally wrong. What are our medical leaders in the AMA and the Royal Colleges doing? Haven't they any sense of direction?

Instead of warming their bums, they should be taking the Medical Board to court and demanding freedom from this fraudulent behaviour. Our job as doctors is to clear up perceptions, not help distort them. I will always question the mental health of the medical profession if they keep supporting CPD. It is not a path to sanity and credibility. "

Do you agree with my observations? What should the medical profession be doing about the CPD? It is an archaic puerile system that reflects the mental health of our profession. Are you still going to the kindergarten? Does the profession have any self-respect? Please think and take action. To me, CPD makes us a laughingstock.

AMA warns over vapes' toxic threat to our health, environment and future Media Release

Thursday 20 June 2024

With the Senate soon to consider the government vaping reforms, the AMA is urging all members of parliament to consider the health of the community and the environmental impact of vaping.

"If you care about the health of our children, and the health of our environment, then the choice is clear on vaping – support the reforms before the parliament," AMA President Professor Steve Robson said.

"Anything less is a betrayal of a healthier, safer and cleaner future for our kids."

Vaping in Australia has tripled since 2019, with a rise from 2.5 per cent to 7 per cent in 2022-2023, according to the National Drug Strategy Household Survey.

Professor Robson said vapes are an "environmental triple-threat" with plastic waste in the device body and pod, electronic waste in the form of lithium-ion batteries and a heating element, and hazardous waste due to the heavy metals in the vape and nicotine in the e-juice.

"Vapes are classified as hazardous waste around the country but most vapes are being thrown away in the garbage, or worse – dumped as litter – which is terrible for the environment," Professor Robson said.

"The plastic waste from the device body and pod never fully decomposes.

"Rather than decomposing, plastic turns into microplastics, or tiny pieces of plastic, which continue to pollute the environment and pollute our food and drinking water.

"The electronic waste or lithium-ion battery waste can corrode and the metals and chemicals – like lithium – leak into the ground, polluting the soil and water long into the future.

"Incorrectly disposed batteries can also cause fires in garbage trucks and landfills, which can harm people, animals and the land.

"We know liquid nicotine is also an acute hazardous waste that is toxic to humans if consumed."

The AMA said material used to make vapes also comes at a cost to the environment with deforestation and destruction of habitats from mining for materials and carbon emissions from their manufacture and transport.

The National Drug Strategy Household Survey also found the use of e-cigarettes is more likely than smoking in areas more socioeconomic advantage.

"Anyone in parliament who is serious about looking after the environment cannot turn a blind eye to the environmental menace that vapes have become," Professor Robson said.

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Federal Budget 2024/2025 Highlights For Individuals and Small Businesses

Personal Income Tax

The changes to the personal income tax rates for individual taxpayers will commence on 1 July 2024.

Taxable Income	Tax on Taxable Income
\$0 - \$18,200	Nil
\$18,201 - \$45,000	16c for each \$1 over \$18,200
\$45,001 - \$135,000	\$4,288 plus 30c for each \$1 over \$45,000
\$135,001 - \$190,000	\$31,288 plus for 37c each \$1 over \$135,000
\$190,001 and above	\$51,638 plus 45c for each \$1 over \$190,000

Instant Asset Write-Off for Small Businesses

The Instant Asset Write-off will increase to \$20,000 for assets first used or installed ready for use between 1 July 2024 and 30 June 2025 instead of the \$1,000 limit. In addition, the "lock-out" rules for small businesses opting out of the simplified depreciation rules will remain suspended until 30 June 2025. The proposed increase to \$30,000 for the 2025 financial year has still not been passed by the legislature.

Energy Bill Relief Fund

From 1 July 2024 to 30 June 2025, all households, including individuals and families, will receive a \$300 rebate, and eligible small businesses will receive a \$325 rebate for cost-of-living relief.

Commissioner of Taxation's Discretion for Resurrected Tax Debts

The Australian Tax Office (ATO) was recently criticised for resurrecting old tax debts that had previously been placed on hold as being 'uneconomical to pursue.' The Commissioner is given the discretion not to use a taxpayer's refund to offset old tax debts where the Commissioner had put that old tax debt on hold prior to 1 January 2017.

Superannuation of Paid Parental Leave

Superannuation will be paid on Commonwealth Government-funded Paid Parental Leave for births and adoptions after 1 July 2025 at the prevailing Superannuation Guarantee Rate. The Government will provide support to Small business employers administering Paid Parental Leave with \$10 million allocated over two years commencing 1 July 2024.

Foreign Resident Capital Gains Tax (CGT) Changes

Amendments will apply to CGT events commencing on or after 1 July 2025 to clarify and broaden the types of assets that foreign residents are subject to CGT, amend the point-in-time principal asset test to a 365-day testing period and require foreign residents disposing of shares and other membership interests greater than \$20 million in value to notify the ATO, prior to the transaction being executed.

Extending and Funding Compliance Programs

The Government will extend Personal Income Tax Compliance, Shadow Economy Compliance, and the Tax Avoidance Task Force and fund the new ATO Counterfraud Strategy, which will affect taxpayers and tax agents.

Digital ID

The Government has committed \$288 million to support the delivery and expansion of Australia's Digital ID System so more Australians can realise the economic, security and privacy benefits of Digital ID.

Modernising Digital Assets and Payments Regulation

The Government will provide \$7.5 million over 4 years, then \$1.5 million ongoing, to improve competition and consumer protections for services enabled by new technology, develop legislation to regulate platforms that hold digital assets and introduce a new regulatory framework for payment service providers, including digital wallets.

Robert O'Neill (Australian Army), Counter-insurgency , Department of Veterans' Affairs

Bob O'Neill served as an intelligence officer in Vietnam.

His work in counter-insurgency took him out into Vietnamese villages gathering intelligence.

When Bob O'Neill went to Vietnam in 1966, counter-insurgency was an established strategy in the Australian Army.

"Counter-insurgency is a process of trying to build popular support for the government of the day or whoever the military force from outside is supporting."

As an intelligence officer, Bob depended on Vietnamese villagers as his main source of information about the enemy.


"The local Vietnamese people let us know very quickly whether they liked us or not; we'd get groups of people coming in from particular villages bringing gifts "bringing chickens, vegetables, fruit and so on and they would stand around and have a chat with us".

That made the gathering of intelligence so much easier because they thought about us in positive terms rather like themselves, not just a bunch of foreigners in strange uniforms speaking a different language who'd come to oppress them.

And above all, you did not want to be associated with destruction unless it was absolutely essential.

There was a tendency amongst our allies to see us as overly soft in our methods.

There's something about Americans; they're brave people "" when they get mad they really go after what is making them mad.

We tend to be a bit cooler in our approach."

Though the strategy was successful in Phuoc Tuy Province, by the time he left, Bob was unsure of the future.

"We went away feeling that we had accomplished something but, whether it would be good enough we just didn't know.

And of course when the Tet Offensive come along, that was just such a smack in the face to all of the foreign troops who were in Vietnam that one became very despondent thereafter."

Bob O'Neill became Professor O'Neill, a renowned scholar of military history, but Vietnam is with him still.

"Really this was a highlight of our lives. We didn't particularly like it at the time but you come to know people so well, and that was great."
