Those with true art will face with relish the adventures of the unknown part of the time yet to come.



Suicide Watch Campaign Launched

Sadly, almost 500 Queenslanders will take their with follow up. Our

life in the next 12 months and on average, seven Australians die by suicide each day. It's the leading cause of death for men and women under the age of 34.



Queensland GPs care about their local communities and want to help.

As a result of these latest statistics AMA Queensland launched its latest campaign, *Suicide Watch* which urges anyone having trouble seeing a way forward to visit or phone their GP for urgent help.

The campaign is in response to concerns for the mental health of Queenslanders following last summer's floods and Cyclone Yasi.

As it marks the one year anniversary of both natural disasters fast approaching it was important to reinforce the message to people across the state that help was at hand.

As part of the campaign AMA Queensland enlisted members to develop an emotive television clip, featuring GPs and other medical professionals, encouraging Queenslanders in need to make contact with their Family Doctor.

This video clip is currently posted on You Tube and has received around 2,000 views already. This clip is also being televised over the Christmas period to reach out to those in need.

A recent survey of AMA Queensland members found just over half (51%) of doctors believed the main reason people with a mental health issue didn't seek assistance was because they were reluctant to admit they had a problem.

Anyone who needs to talk about a problem should feel they can visit their local GP who can provide a personal, private and confidential service I encourage everyone to visit youtu.be/MkGmo6C9xSo to watch the clip and also pass it on to friends, family and colleagues.

Doctors are not isolated from this message and if you or your colleagues are having a tough time remember there is assistance by way of the Doctors Health Advisory Service Queensland. A dedicated phone service is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week for medical and health practitioners in need. This number is (07) 3833 4352.

This AMA Queensland initiative not only highlights the value of the Family Doctor in our community, it also is an important step in enabling discussion about suicide and encouraging people to seek help when they are struggling. I am proud of our organisation providing this leadership.

As an election looms, AMA Queensland continues to push for health to be front and centre of the debate. Our *Time for Answers* campaign continues to ask candidates to answer questions about health services in their region.

On that note I wish you all a happy and safe Christmas and look forward to tackling the many challenges facing our health system as we move forward into a State Election in 2012.

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SNAPSHOT FROM THE PAST - Tribunal Rejects Protest on Antigen Story *Repaira Newsletter from December 1939 Issue 9, page 5*

The Australian Broadcasting Tribunal has declined to take any action on a complaint by the Redcliffe and Districts Local Medical Association about a controversial item on the programme, A Current Affair.

The complaint alleged that an item suggesting that triple antigen innoculations could be dangerous was unbalanced and irresponsible.

Following moves by Dr Col Holloway, the association wrote to the producers of A Current Affair and the Tribunal.

Channel 9's answer, print-

ed last month, denied the report was incorrect or unbalanced.

Now, the Tribunal has decided it has no power to act on such a complaint and has sent the association a lengthy document outlining the Tribunal's Television Programme Standards.

In its letter, the tribunal said

Concern at use of narcotics

To the Secretary,

I am concerned about the attitudes of publiclyemployed medical practitioners towards narcotics.

For many years, I have been concerned about the liberal use of narcotics in public hospitals to the point where many drug abusers I have seen will seek admission with various real or exaggerated problems.

This attitude has come through in public drug therapy programmes. Their answer to drug problems

seem to be to give people more drugs (methadone etc.)

This came to a head recently when I sent a young professional women to a government drug treatment agency when a crisis made her seek treatment for the first time.

Initially they didn't want to see her, saying it wasn't important that she had sought help. Eventually, after I insisted, they agreed to see

I had requested admission but instead she was sent straight back to her bewildered family with a handbag full of Endone tablets.

This patient who wanted to get away from narcotics for the sake of her career and family had them pushed on her by a government agency.

Accusations are often levelled against private practitioners who are mostly very careful with narcotics.

Perhaps, the Health Department better look in its own backyard. I didn't think Australia had free, legal narcotics.

The giving of oral preparations is insane. They have a good street value and there is no check on whose neck they go down.

I would like to hear from any of your readers who have encountered similar cases.

Tribunal rejects protest on antigen story

the standards guide defines current affairs programmes as programmes which deal with social, economic, political and other societal issues, and include interviews and commentaries dealing in depth with issues.

"Provided stations comply with the provisions of the standards, the Tribunal does not normally interfere in the day-to-day programming arrangements of the stations, such as selecting which issues are presented by a current affairs programme.

"These are matters for the producers of the programmes.

"It should also be explained that although the standards require news programmes to be presented accurately, fairly and impartially, no such requirement is placed on current affairs programmes such as A Current Affair.

"On the basis of the infor-

mation provided, it appears that a breach of the Tribunal's standards is not involved.

"In the circumstances, although your association's views are understandable, further action on the part of the Tribunal does not seem warranted.

INQUIRY

"Your association may be interested to know, however, that the Tribunal is currently conducting an inquiry into whether it should determine a new television programme standard or standards to provide the right of reply to any person or group directly affected by broadcasters on controversial issues of.

"The inquiry team, which has received a copy of your letter, will write soon with further information about the inquiry," the letter said.

The LMA executive has decided not to pursue the matter further.

DESTINATION: BUNYA

An emphasis on family involvement in medical conferences distinguishes the first 'Medicine in the Mountains' medical week-

end planned for next September.

The weekend in the Bunya Mountains near Kingaroy is being planned by the Queensland Faculty of the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners.

History of Margate

Margate is a residential suburb of the Moreton Bay Region. It is situated in the east of the Redcliffe Peninsula, approximately 26 kilometers north-northeast of Brisbane.

Margate Beach area was inhabited by nomadic Aboriginal tribes for thousands of years prior to European settlement which began in 1824 becoming Queensland's first colony. Unfortunately this attempt at establishing the settlement failed soon after and the colony was moved to Brisbane. Agriculture became the region's main source of income and prosperity until the late 1800's when the population expanded. Holidaymakers and day trippers lured by the waters of Moreton Bay began to visit the area in large numbers. The construction of the Hornibrook Highway Bridge in 1935 saw easier access to Brisbane and a larger population growth for the area.

Margate features one of the longest mainland coastal stretches of a sand beach in the area. A boardwalk promenade embellishes the scenery for those who enjoy walking, cycling, rollerblading or scootering including viewing shelters and seating and barbecue facilities with views to Moreton Island. This enhanced lifestyle and atmosphere of beach living rests easy with visitors and is just metres from the waters of Moreton Bay.

The \$6 million Margate CBD major redevelopment was completed in November 2007 modernising the distinctive shopping precinct, making the area more attractive and comfortable.

At regular intervals along the esplanade visitors can enjoy the seating and shelters, with barbecues and other picnic amenities. There's a favourite swimming spot with clean white sand and sheltered waters - making it a popular dipping spot for families with young children.

Scotts Point at the southern end of Margate is perfect for windswrfing. This is one of the few locations close to Brisbane which is not majorly affected by tides.

The quaint Scotts Point swimming pavilion is an historical reference to a bygone era. There are many Norfolk Pine trees lining the esplanade which were planted by the first settlers in the area, more than 150 years ago.

Margate Beach has a busy shopping precinct with shops clustered around Oxley Avenue. You can choose from fine diners overlooking the water through to cafes and takeaway shops. Margate Parade offers great waterfront dining and fish and chips at the beach are also a well practised past time.

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The campaign by Redcliffe and Districts LMA to have fencing of domestic swimming pools made compulsory, has won positive support from the Redcliffe City Council

An LMA deputation to the Health and Community Services Committee on December 12 was told the Council was preparing to introduce by-laws for pool fencing, "as soon as possible."

LMA president, Dr Kerry Garske, and paediatrics spokesman, Dr John McCreanor, who made up the deputation came away delighted with the council's response.

Dr Garske said it seemed the council had already made up its mind to act on the need for the by-laws before the deputation arrived.

"The council has asked us for in-put into the drafting of the by-laws," Dr Garske said.

"It expects to have them

drawn up and in place within six months.

"We were very satisfied with the hearing we were accorded and with the news that we received."

Dr McCreanor went to the meeting armed with comprehensive statistics showing a total of 48 child drownings in the Brisbane City area since 1980 and five in the Peninsula area between 1981 and 1987.

Dr McCreanor said there had been four drownings in the Brisbane area in the first 10 months of this year, compared with six for the whole of 1988.

There were insufficient records available to determine the number of drownings in the Redcliffe City area since 1987.

The deputation told the council that Brisbane and Redcliffe were out of step with most other Local Government Authorities throughout the country in requiring the provision of some form of fencing around domestic swimming pools.

Dr McCreanor said the LMA would like to see bylaws requiring isolation fencing as a minimum

He said more than half the recorded drownings in the past decade had been in the victim's own family swimming pool

swimming pool.

About 25 per cent had been children visiting relatives or friends and neighbours children accounted for 12 per cent.

"The biggest danger ages seem to be two years and one year," Dr McCreanor told the coun-

The statistics covered children aged up to 14.

However, there were no records of how many "near misses" there might have been, with children rescued or requiring only treatment at a doctor's surgery.

Dr Garske said the committee had asked to see a copy of regulations applying in New Zealand, which had been referred to by Dr McCreanor.

Dr Garske said plans were now being made to take the campaign to the Brisbane City Council.

"Information supplied by our members indicates that the problem is far more serious in the northern suburbs than on the Redcliffe Peninsula," he

VW Polo GTI "Can I Check Your Oil?"

For most of us that new car smell is more memorable than just about anything else associated with the purchase of a vehicle.

Long after we have forgotten the salesman's name and how much that new car cost we can all still remember what the car smelt like when we first climbed inside.

And whilst we all know about the hazards of glue-sniffing, we are

all strangely addicted to those volatile organic compounds leaching out of our car's interior.

With so many connections between the olfactory bulb and the limbic system we were probably

programmed to remember those smells and perhaps there might even be some survival value for human beings to experience the purchase of a new car.



A much less palatable smell though is anything that emanates from the exhaust pipe and burning oil might top that list.

But an anaesthetist colleague of mine has become a little obsessed with the contents of his exhaust gases as he has discovered that his brand new VW Polo GTI is using one litre of oil every 1,000



of the exhaust one can only assume that the oil is being combusted as he drives along as it certainly isn't dripping onto his garage floor.

The VW owner manual reassuringly says that, "oil consumption can be up to 0.5 litre / 1,000 km" and that "engine oil consumption is likely to be higher in the first 5,000 km".

At 6.1 L/100 km that one litre of oil usage is fairly close to a 60:1 mix which would keep most two-stroke motors running for a while.

And at \$20 per litre for the special VW oil he might find himself spending \$300 per year on oil if the

consumption continues at its current rate.

Higher oil consumption can become an issue as car-makers strive for engines that have lower friction and use less fuel and of course the running-in of the vehicle is also a factor at play.

VW recommends that in the first 1,000 kilometres:

- Do not drive faster than three quarters of top speed
- Do not use full throttle
- Avoid high engine speeds
- Do not tow a trailer.

To that list I'd add don't let the engine labour in too high a gear.

There are also those who advise in the first few kilometres brief applications of full throttle in a high gear

to force the rings against the bore walls.

This seems to be a technique preferred in demo vehicles at dealerships which are always flogged mercilessly on test drives.

So my colleague is paying very close attention to the Polo's dip-stick and the oil warning light and he has promised to keep us posted about his Polo's thirst for oil.

December at Redcliffe Hospital has continued apace for staff involved in planning, upgrading and building a better service for our local community. After a year which has seen some extraordinary climatic events affecting our state, I'm sure we are all looking forward to hopefully relaxing a little with friends and family - and reflecting on the year.

Among the achievements at Redcliffe Hospital in 2011 is the completion of the Transport Hub, which assists our patients return to their homes or to safely transfer between hospitals for treatment. The Transit Lounge is a comfortable and pleasant area where our patients can wait for their loved ones to collect them. We hope the new lounge will make the journey home much less stressful for all.

The long awaited Medical Imaging redevelopment which will upgrade our imaging ability and revamp the working space for our medical imaging staff has almost reached completion. I commend the heroic effort of the unit staff who have worked under trying conditions during the redevelopment. We are also well under way with the upgrade to the Paediatric areas of the hospital.

With an eye to the largest group of consumers within the local community, we are reviewing models of care in various areas, but particularly in Medicine & Older Persons. This has seen the development of a comprehensive service for aged patients

and the opening of the Delirium & Falls Unit within Ward 4 West.

The eight bed unit will include a secure area and is designed to reduce issues for patients with delirium and general confusion.

We are working on improving diversional activities for patients with delirium and increasing nursing intervention to reduce the period of delirium for patients in our care. Ongoing education will be provided for nursing staff and practical approaches to bed rails, plus doors on the area to reduce the risk of delirium-related events are all being brought into place.

Since December a Geriatric Evaluation Management Unit has been established under the management of Dr Catherine Yelland, who is willing to discuss patient issues and receive direct referrals of patients from GPs.

Above all at Redcliffe Hospital we continue daily to be focussed on our vision: Together, we make a difference.

I look forward to working hard to progress our vision into 2012.

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MENTAL HEALTH – BE VIGILANT THIS CHRISTMAS

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AMA President, Dr Steve Hambleton, today urged all Australians to keep an eye out for neighbours and relatives for signs of stress, distress, depression or loneliness over the Christmas period.

Dr Hambleton said that the Christmas season is a time of joy, celebration and family for most people but it can also be a time of sadness and isolation for others

"The Christmas period can heighten loneliness, social isolation, financial stress, and other stressors, and this is associated with a higher use of crisis and support services such as Lifeline.

"Support services report that suicide and selfharm rates are typically high over the Christmas period.

"At the same time, there is increased demand on mental health services and support when they are not running at full capacity.

"It is also a busy time for public hospitals.

"Rural areas in particular feel the impact of reduced mental health support at holiday times.

"It is important that family and friends look out for any signs of mental illness and offer comfort to people and refer them to appropriate help where it is available," Dr Hambleton said.

AMA Queensland (AMAQ) launched a campaign earlier in the year outlining signs of mental illness to look out for, which include:

- complaints of continued poor sleep;
- observations that a person is easily overwhelmed:
- the use of drugs or alcohol;
- a pattern of withdrawing from family and friends:
- problems performing at work;
- startling easily and declining invitations for social engagements; and
- increased or unreasonable irritability.

AMAQ also recently launched the Suicide Watch initiative to urge anyone having trouble seeing a way forward to see or phone a GP for urgent help. For more information about the campaign and identifying signs of mental illness, visit the AMAQ website at www.amaq.com.au
